She has an extensive publications record, including *Gender, Crime and Justice* (Open University Press, 1987) co-edited with Pat Carlen, *Offending Women* (Routledge, 1990), *Girls' Violence: Myths and Realities* (SUNY Press, 2004) co-edited with Christine Alder from Melbourne University and *Punishment in the Community* (Willan, 2005), co-authored with Clare Hoy. She is a member of the Parole Board of England and Wales.
